# Walton Hills Police Department Information

## SENIOR CITIZENS' POLICE ACADEMY

The Walton Hills Senior Citizens' Police Academy held its second graduation ceremony in December 2012. Fifteen (15) cadets proudly graduated from the academy. The first Walton Hills Senior Citizens' Police Academy graduated in July and was attended by twelve (12) cadets. The cadets received certificates and academy graduation polo shirts.

The Senior Citizen' Police Academy was designed by Chief Kenn Thellmann to give senior citizens an overview of the Walton Hills Police Department, SEALE (Southeast Area Law Enforcement) Units, Communications Center, EMS (emergency medical services), basic fire safety and CPR. Graduates of the course walked away with a better understanding of the operations of the various departments and units and a greater awareness and appreciation of the challenges and decisions faced by the special units and the Walton Hills Police Department.



During the program, representatives from various units of the Police Department attended the academy and presented information about their unit and how it works. Cadets were able to handle equipment used by Walton Hills Officers and Detectives as well as ask questions and learn firsthand about police work. Cadets were afforded an opportunity to complete a ride-along with a Walton Hills Police Officer.



Some of the topics that were taught included: Patrol Operations, SWAT and Bomb Squad, Police K-9, Basic First Aid, Crime Scene Investigation (CSI), Communications, Fraud, Fire Safety, CPR, Shoot – Don't Shoot Shooting Range and a Graduation Ceremony. There were nothing but positive comments from the cadets on how well they liked the academy and most have asked to attend a second time or requested an advanced academy.

The next academy is scheduled to begin the last week in March 2013. If you are interested, stop by the Village Hall for an application or information or call (440) 232-1313. # Walton Hills Police Dept. Information-continued



Last year, Council passed an ordinance to define a process for handling false alarms in the Village. The ordinance below (804.07) will begin to be enforced in February of 2013 after nearly a one year grace period. If you have any questions, please contact the Police Department at (440) 232-1313.

## Walton Hills Codified Ordinance: 804.07 False Alarms

(a) Any premises located within the Village may be equipped with an emergency alarm consisting of equipment, mechanical or electrical, arranged to signal the occurrence of an unauthorized entry or other activity requiring urgent attention to which the Police Department and/or the Fire Department is expected to respond.

(b) As used in this section, "false alarm" means an emergency alarm, activated by inadvertence, negligence or unintentional acts, including, but not limited to, malfunction of the alarm system, to which the Police Department and/or Fire Department responds. The definition excludes false alarms caused by: testing or repairing of telephone equipment or lines; testing or repairing of the normal power supply source for alarms installed on residential subdivisions; acts of God, such as earthquake, flood, windstorm, thunder, hail, or lightning; an attempted illegal entry of which there is visible evidence; or the user acting under a sincere belief that a need exists to call the Police Department and/or Fire Department. Multiple alarms received by the Communications Center before the system can be deactivated within a reasonable period of time shall be considered a single alarm.

(c) False alarm charges shall be made to the person in control of the property on which an emergency alarm is installed as follows, unless waived, in writing for good cause by the Police Department. Annually means per calendar year (January 1 through December 31).

(1) Residential users. A warning shall be issued and no charge shall be made for the first three false alarms annually. A charge of twenty five dollars (\$25.00) shall be for the fourth false alarm annually and all subsequent alarms during said calendar year.

(2) Business users. A warning shall be issued and no charge shall be made for the first three false alarms annually. A charge of fifty dollars (\$50.00) shall be for the fourth false alarm annually and all subsequent alarms during said calendar year.

(d) Notwithstanding the fee to be assessed, as set forth in division (c) hereof, no charge shall be made for the first, second or third false alarm; nor shall there be any charge for a false alarm to which there is no response by the Police or Fire Departments, nor when it has been established to the satisfaction of the Police Chief or Fire Chief that the owner or operator of the business or residence could not have prevented it with the exercise of ordinary care.

(e) If there is a response by the Police Department or Fire Department to a false alarm resulting from improper equipment, installation, neglect and/or servicing by the alarm company, business and/or agent, the alarm business (company) may be charged a civil penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per false alarm by the Safety Director or his or her designee.

(f) A grace period of 30 days from the date of installation shall be granted for newly installed alarm systems. During this period, no false alarms shall be counted towards the three allowable false alarms before charges are assessed.

(g) A grace period of 30 days from the effective date of this section shall not be included in the charges set forth in this section.

(h) Residential and business false alarm charges shall apply whether the alarm is received from an automatic device or from an alarm monitoring service under this chapter. Any charge for a false alarm remaining unpaid 30 days after the date of the mailing of the invoice for same shall be determined to be delinquent, will result in a certified letter sent from the Police Chief's office to pay the amount due within ten days or it will be added to their property tax bill with a penalty of 10%. If the amount due is not paid by then, the Director of Finance shall certify the amount due to the County Auditor for collection on the owner's property tax bill. (Ord. 2012-1. Passed 2-21-12.)

**Changes Coming to Senior/Handicapped Resident Lawn Care Program** - Councilman Brian Spitznagel and all councilmembers have put together the following information to inform residents about the changes to this year's Senior/Handicapped Resident Lawn Care Program:



The Village strives to give our senior and handicapped residents a quality summer lawn care program that helps to maintain your property while doing so at a lower cost than you would otherwise be able to get. Experience and feedback has let us know what parts of the program work and what needs to be changed to make it better. As a result, the program will change from a scheduled service to a seasonal flat-rate service, much like the winter snowplowing program.

Many residents had problems with the cutting schedule of the previous program. If the contractor couldn't cut the lawn due to weather conditions, the lawn might not have gotten cut until the next scheduled service, which might have been several weeks.

The new program doesn't work on a particular schedule. Rather, it provides for your lawn to be cut as much as needed to be kept within a maximum length of 3 ½ inches throughout the season. This will result in more cuts in the spring and less cuts in the summer, but the lawn will be kept uniform. With an average lawn, you can expect one cut per week in the spring and early summer. This interval might be extended during the very hot weather when the grass doesn't grow as fast. The program will give the contractor the flexibility to tailor their cutting intervals to individual properties. Due to the condition of the lawn, drainage, etc., some lawns might grow faster than others while some could go longer between cuts. It also gives you the ability to have the contractor service your property as needed to keep it within the limit. In short; if your lawn needs to be cut more often, then it will be cut more often. The whole purpose is to give you a more dependable program that maintains your lawn to higher standards throughout the year.

It must be stressed that the Village is acting as a bartering agent for the group of residents signed up for the program to get your lawns cut at the least expensive rate we can find. We are not the service provider. Your contract is with the provider who wins the bid for the program. The Village will intervene on your behalf as a last resort, but any issues needing to be addressed must first be handled between you and the provider.

We will be advertising for bids this month and will publish the seasonal price once a bid is accepted. **If you are a contractor and would like to submit a bid, please visit our website ([www.waltonhillsohio.gov](http://www.waltonhillsohio.gov)) or call the Village Hall for more information (440.232.7800).** A full description of the program can be obtained at the Village Hall and an application will be published in the next *Journal*. As stated in last month's *Walton Hills Journal*, the residents of the Village will have a say on the future of Walton Hills when they vote on the proposed income tax increase on May 7, 2013. At stake is the autonomy and self preservation of the Village as it has existed over the last 62 years. In order for the Village to continue operating independent of a merger with one of its neighboring communities, it needs to fund appropriate police and fire protection, refuse collection, timely replacement of machinery and equipment and infrastructure (streets, culverts, water and sewer lines).

For years, the Village has relied primarily on its income taxes and interest income. Over the last several years, income taxes have significantly decreased and the interest income is almost non-existent with less money to invest and the rates being so low. For example:

- 2006 Income Tax Collections \$4,519,172; Interest Earnings \$466,464
- 2012 Income Tax Collections \$3,325,607; Interest Earnings \$ 831

The elimination of the estate tax beginning in 2013 will also impact the Village. The Village received over \$200,000 in estate taxes in 2012. Adding to this is less money received from the State of Ohio through its local government allocation which started back in 1935. Initially, the State began freezing its distribution to municipalities and has recently begun to decrease its distributions. There is concern that the State may totally eliminate the local government program. Below is a sample of recent State distributions:

- 2009 year actual distribution to Cuyahoga County and its municipalities - \$110,095,720
- 2013 year projected distribution to Cuyahoga County and its municipalities - \$58,578,519

To combat these decreases in revenues, the Village has decreased its full-time employment from 35 to the current level of 24. Any further reductions would negatively impact the services of the Village. The Administration continues to be resourceful. To assure future stability and keep away from a "backs to wall" financial situation, the Village is placing this income tax on the ballot. The added tax would generate approximately \$887,500. The breakdown on who will pay is as follows:

- Residents \$200,000
- Non-residents \$587,500
- Businesses \$100,000

**Other alternatives are as follows:**

**1. Increase the inside millage for property tax** – Currently, the Village is assessing .30 mills of its available 3.88 mills. The current .30 mills generates approximately \$40,000. The 3.88 mills can be implemented without the vote of the people. Most communities, if not all, utilize all of their inside millage. The Village would realize additional revenues of **\$447,000**. The breakdown on who would pay is as follows:

- Residents \$201,000
- Businesses 138,000
- Public Utilities 69,000
- State of Ohio 39,000

**2. Decrease the income tax credit from 100% to 75%**  
Based on a review of 2009 and 2010 W-2s filed with the Village, Walton Hills' residents working outside the village would pay **\$187,000**.

**3. Charge for refuse collections**- Each resident would be assessed the annual cost of the Village's waste collection services approximating \$140,000. Based on approximately 1,000 households, the annual fee would be \$140. This amount would be placed on all residential property tax bills.

**4. Begin eliminating services & capital improvements** -  
Some examples and their costs are:

- Brush Chipping \$136,448 annual cost
- Leaf Pick-up 45,840 annual cost
- Street resurfacing 450,000 annual program

In conclusion, the Village is not waiting to the last minute to assure stability and secure its own place in Northeast Ohio. For many years Ford was one of the main reasons the Village had very large fund balances, zero debt, super low property taxes and residential sanitary sewer payments paid by the Village. The Ford Motor Company is leaving soon. The largest return to the Village with the least amount of hurt to Walton Hills' residents is to pass the 2.5% income tax in May.

In 2009, they relocated to their current 40,000 square foot facility in Walton Hills. This move enabled them to add machines and personnel to keep up with the growing demands of their customers. With the accessibility of this location to Cleveland and the space to expand, they now offer complete manufacturing and secondary processes with quick turnarounds. They are considering adding on another 25,000 square feet to their building.

Since 2009, the number of machinists employed by Dunham Products has tripled, much of which occurred in the last year. In the thread roll department, Dunham Products now has a larger capacity for various sizes of threading. The new sems machine and high-speed slant machine permits them to competitively accommodate high-speed, automated runs. As always, they have the ability to re-roll, blank roll, knurl and roll threads for most material grades and hardnesses. With the automatic bar feeders and live tooling on the new CNC's, they have the ability to make more complete and complex parts with faster prototyping. All of these new capabilities translate to lower cost and faster production.

**LEGISLATION UNANAMOUSLY APPROVED AT THE 1.15.13 REGULAR COUNCIL MTG.**

Ordinance 2013-1, amends Section 260.10 of the Codified Ordinances of the Village of Walton Hills with respect to uniform allowances.

**VACANCY ON PLANNING COMMISSION**

Due to the unfortunate passing of resident Walt Pracejus, a vacancy has occurred on the Planning Commission. Any resident interested in serving on the Planning Commission should submit a letter of interest to Mayor Kevin Hurst by February 28th. Although not required, it would be beneficial for applicants to know how to read a blueprint.

The Planning Commission consists of five members: the Mayor, one member of Council and three electors of the Village to be appointed by the Mayor for terms of six years each. The appointed three electors shall be compensated at the rate of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) annually, plus thirty dollars (\$30.00) for each meeting attended, with a maximum of ten compensated meetings per year. All compensation is to be paid quarterly.

The Planning Commission is the platting authority of the Village and shall administer the Subdivision Regulations. It shall initiate, when appropriate, zoning amendments and recommend uses appropriate for the land. It shall hear and determine application for conditional zoning certificates. It shall review and approve commercial and industrial site plans and shall plan the appropriate development of land. It shall plan the location, construction and vacation of public buildings, thoroughfares, and public and private utilities. The Commission shall perform such other functions as are referred or delegated to it by Council or the Mayor.

# EDUCATION ALTERNATIVES

## St. Barnabas School



St. Barnabas School, located at 9200 Olde Eight Road in Northfield, is a thriving private Roman Catholic elementary school committed to Catholic education grounded in the Gospel message, rooted in the Catholic tradition and infused with spiritual values that engage all stakeholders in prayer, worship, and service. Their extensive curriculum meets or exceeds the standards prescribed by the Cleveland Catholic Diocese and the State of Ohio. St. Barnabas students outperform the national average on standardized tests, consistently ranking in the 90<sup>th</sup> percentiles of standardized achievement tests that are administered annually. Their graduates frequently advance to excel at the finest high schools in the region.

In 2011, St. Barnabas School was recognized as a 2011 National Blue Ribbon School of Excellence, considered the highest honor an American school can achieve. This program honors public and private elementary, middle, and high schools that are academically superior. Only 50 schools nationally are given the Blue Ribbon distinction each year. St. Barnabas received this honor because their student academic achievement ranks in the top 10 percent of schools in the nation in reading and mathematics.

Although approximately 90% of St. Barnabas students are Catholic, all faiths are welcome. However, all students must participate in daily religion classes and attend mass once a week. 3-year old preschool through eighth grade is taught at St. Barnabas.

St. Barnabas is committed to academic excellence by providing a wide range of educational services to meet the needs of a student body that is diverse in its abilities. Their academic program offers students in kindergarten through eighth grade a challenging and comprehensive approach. Core academic subjects are taught at the school. Computer education is integrated into the curriculum of kindergarten through eighth grade to provide students with all necessary technical skills. They offer an accelerated reading program beginning in kindergarten. St. Barnabas has a fully equipped computer and science laboratory. The learning staff has been trained and is implementing the use of Response to Intervention (RTI). This program allows for differentiated instruction. They have small class sizes, averaging 25 students. Their support services include Roots and Wings (Gifted program), school psychologist, intervention specialist, remedial teacher, nurse, nurse's aide, and speech therapy.

There are over 700 students at St. Barnabas which participate in over 32 extracurricular activities and sports (CYO) to round out their school experience. Activities include: the Mary Program, Student Council, Chess Club, Cooking Club, Yoga Club, Ski Club, Mythology Club, Geography Bee, Science Olympiad, 3-D Animation, peer tutoring in math and reading, and National History Day. There is also an art elective which is offered, and this year students will make t-shirts from flip flops, enabling them to make useful items from recycled materials.
