

Know What's At Stake

If the proposed 0.5% Earned Income Tax Levy passes:

- Safety services (police, fire, EMS) will remain the same.
- Waste collection, leaf pickup and brush chipping will remain the same.
- Repairs and improvements to public infrastructure, such as sewer lines, water lines, pavements and culverts, will be made.
- The Village will make improvements to Sagamore Road and repair secondary roads.
- General maintenance, including snow plowing and salting all Village roadways, will remain at current levels.
- Capital repairs and improvement projects will be funded.

If It Fails:

- All planned road improvement projects will be suspended.
- Many services currently provided at no cost will be eliminated or assessed:
 - ◊ Brush chipping = eliminated or assessed
 - ◊ Leaf pickup = eliminated or assessed
 - ◊ Waste collection = assessed at \$150 annually
- Snow and ice control will be reduced.
- Village roads, equipment and infrastructure will continue to deteriorate.
- All senior and recreation programs will be eliminated or merged with other communities.
- An Inside Millage Committee will be created:
 - ◊ The Village property tax is presently 0.3% (lowest in Cuyahoga County).
 - ◊ The Village may raise the property tax without a resident vote to 3.88 mills. If you own a \$150,000 home, this would increase your property tax from \$13.78 per year to approximately \$178 per year.
 - ◊ The committee would investigate this necessity.

This is worth repeating - if passed, the proposed earned income tax would raise an estimated \$925,000. The approximate breakdown of who pays is as follows:

- **Residents: 20% or \$187,500**
- **Businesses: 11% or \$100,000**
- **Non-residents working in the Village: 69% or \$637,500**

If failed, residents would pay 100% of the waste collection fees, totaling \$150,000.

The Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District has partnered with Walton Hills and 58 other communities in Cuyahoga County to offer a Household Hazardous Waste Disposal Program. This will take place at the Service Center from Monday, May 6th through Friday, May 10th from 8:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Household hazardous wastes are materials that are marked dangerous, caustic or flammable. The District can only accept materials that originated from a household and not a commercial source. Latex paint will not be accepted. It is comprised mostly of water and is not a hazardous material. To dispose of latex paint, solidify and place with your curbside trash. Ace Hardware, Lowe's Home Improvement, The Home Depot, and TrueValue Hardware have national compact fluorescent light bulb (CFL) recycling programs. Customers can simply bring in any expired, unbroken CFL bulbs, and place them in the store's proper recycling container.

Household Material Accepted

- Oil or solvent-based paint, sealers, primers, or coatings (aerosols or liquids)
- Varnishes, polyurethanes, shellacs
- Paint thinner, mineral spirits, turpentine
- Pesticides, herbicides, fungicides
- Caustic household cleaners
- Pool chemicals
- Automotive fluids, motor oil, car batteries
- Adhesives, roof tar, driveway sealer
- Kerosene, gasoline, lighter fluid
- Mercury, fluorescent bulbs (6 ft. length max.)

Materials NOT accepted

- Latex paint
- Explosives, gun powder, ammunition, flares
- Medical waste, pharmaceuticals, medicine, sharps
- Radioactive waste (i.e. smoke detectors)
- Tires
- Electronic, appliances
- Business waste
- Commercial waste



Paper Shredding

As a way to prevent identity theft, we will be offering a personal shredding service for our residents and businesses on Saturday, May 11th from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. You will have the opportunity to dispose of old financial statements, tax forms, bills, medical records and other paper without worrying about identity theft or the effect of dumping paper into the environment!

A powerful, mobile document destruction vehicle will provide quick, confidential destruction and recycling of your items to be shredded. Staples, binder clips and paper clips are acceptable. This program is only for Walton Hills residents / businesses; therefore proof of residency will be required. The shredder and bin will be located at the Village Hall parking lot off of Alexander Road. The program will proceed rain or shine.

Please bring along a paper product for our food pantry. Without a donation, the cost will be \$5 for Walton Hills residents and \$10 for Walton Hills businesses.

We will shred: bank statements, books with hard covers, brochures, cancelled checks, computer printouts, copy paper, envelopes, financial reports, folders, hanging file folders, greeting cards, ledgers, letters, magazines, medical records, pamphlets, tax forms.

We will not shred: plastic bags, boxes, paper products contaminated with food, clothes.

Walton Hills Police Sergeant Stanley Jaworski Promoted to Captain

On March 22, 2013, Sgt. Stanley Jaworski was promoted and sworn-in to the newly created position of Police Captain by Mayor Kevin Hurst. Sgt. Jaworski has been with the Walton Hills Police Department since October 9, 1991, serving first as a Patrolman and then as a Sergeant. The position of Captain is an administrative position, serving as the executive officer and is not incorporated in the collective bargaining unit, replacing the vacant Lieutenant's position. The Captain shall oversee the Police Department in the Police Chief's absence. An assessment center was used for the testing of this position. The swearing in ceremony was attended by many of Captain Jaworski's family members, friends, area police officers and co-workers. Congratulations go out to Captain Jaworski!

Walton Hills Auxiliary Police Unit

In an attempt to keep a proactive approach to the rising needs and burdens of local law enforcement, the Walton Hills Council unanimously voted, with a strong backing from Mayor Hurst, to establish an Auxiliary Police Unit in Walton Hills. The purpose of the Auxiliary Unit will be to protect the lives and property of residents and businesses in the Village in case of emergency or when needed to assist the Police Department. With the opening of Northfield Park's Hard Rock Racino a little over six (6) months away, the additional personnel will be used for traffic control to help the soon to be congested roadways flow smoothly. The Police Auxiliary Unit members will also be utilized as jailers to care for and transport prisoners of the Walton Hills Jail when needed to free up regular officers to maintain the quality of life for our residents and businesses. Auxiliaries may also be required to do vacation checks, recreation center duties during sporting events, parades and funeral details. The funding for the auxiliary program will come from Mayor's Court costs (Auxiliary Program). Applications for the Walton Hills Police Department's Auxiliary Police Unit will be available at the Walton Hills Village Hall beginning May 1, 2013. The selection process will consist of an application, background check, polygraph, psychological, availability and physical agility tests. This position is a compensated position. Senior Citizen Police Academy

With the pending tax issue on the ballot, the Walton Hills Police Department will attempt to still run the third Walton Hills Senior Citizen Police Academy beginning at the end of May. Thus far we have had 27 proud graduates graduate from our Academy. Some of the key points focused on in our Academy are: Crime Scene Investigation, SWAT/Bomb Squad, Mock Shooting Scenarios, K-9 Demonstrations, CPR/ Fire Safety, Police Ride-along, Animal Control, Communications/911 Center Training. The Academy runs for nine (9) weeks, usually on Tuesday mornings, for approximately two (2) hours. The Academy truly is a rewarding/eye opening experience for all who participate. The purpose of the Academy is primarily to help educate the community on what our police officers do on a regular basis. Although police and fire services will remain the same if the Quality of Life issue (Issue 10) does not pass, we will be forced to eliminate some of our programs to help maintain the quality of life that our residents are accustomed to on a smaller operational budget. The Academy is open to any senior 60 years of age or older.



Cuyahoga County Rx Drug Drop Box Program

Improper disposal of medicines presents both a public safety and an environmental hazard. **Never flush prescription medication down the toilet or drain!** These medications will reach streams, lakes, and our drinking water supply. Some fish and amphibians exposed to waters contaminated by medications show signs of developmental and reproductive problems.

Walton Hills is taking steps to alleviate this problem by taking part in the Cuyahoga County Prescription Drug Drop Box Program, which is the newest step in the fight against prescription drug abuse. The county-wide program is a collaborative effort between the County Executive's Administration, Common Pleas Drug Court and the Sheriff's Office.

The drug drop box is located in the lobby of the Village Hall to the left of the window to the Walton Hills Dispatch Center. **Only pills are to be dropped off in the box; no needles or liquids will be accepted.**

A recent national study revealed that 53% of people aged 18-25 obtained prescription pain relievers free from family members or friends for nonmedical use. It may seem wasteful to dispose of costly prescription medication, but properly disposing of unneeded or old medication is one way to prevent prescription drug abuse among your family and friends.

EDUCATION ALTERNATIVES

Lawrence School



Lawrence School is an independent, state-chartered coeducational day school that serves students with learning differences and attention deficits from nearly 70 communities and 10 counties throughout Northeast Ohio. They have two campus locations. Lawrence Lower School is located at 1551 E. Wallings Road in Broadview Heights (grades K-6). Lawrence Upper School is located at 10036 Olde Eight Road in Sagamore Hills (grades 7-12).

Lawrence students have a unique challenge; they learn differently from most of their peers. In a conventional school environment, they often get unfairly labeled as “disabled,” and feel unsuccessful and unrecognized. This learning difference can take the form of a specific learning disability in reading fluency, reading comprehension, or written expression; dyslexia; dysgraphia; or expressive and receptive language disorders. Additionally, students might also have challenges focusing attention (ADD, ADHD) or difficulty with executive functioning. Lawrence School does not accept students with primary diagnoses of autism, cognitive impairment, social/emotional impairment, or behavioral issues.

Lawrence School is built on the foundation that school is a “safe place” where students who learn differently experience a normalization of learning in school and a feeling of belonging. Their mission is *to teach students who have distinct learning styles, ignite their potential, and inspire academic and social success*. Their slogan is ‘where differences are not disabilities and great minds don’t think alike.’ Their vision is that *one day all students who learn differently will have the opportunity, encouragement and resources to fulfill their potential and benefit society*. They acknowledge that students with learning differences are just as intelligent and can learn just as quickly and effectively as other students if they are taught in a way that best suits their unique learning styles.

Lawrence School provides a full academic program including language arts, math, social studies, science, technology, Spanish and American Sign Language, physical education, music and art. The teacher-to-student ratio is 1:9 in the Lower School and 1:11 in the Upper School. The student-teacher relationship, one of encouragement, support, and adaptability in learning, fosters feelings of success and confidence to tackle learning challenges head-on. Teachers work closely with each student to comprehend their learning style and adapt assignments and projects to complement their individual strengths. The Lower School has a gymnasium, art room, science lab, library, and three tech centers. The Upper School has a gymnasium, two science laboratory suites, an arts suite, theater, a weight room, and a library. The entire building is wired for remote access and each student has a dedicated laptop recharging station. The campus has an eight-acre lake, stream, open fields and wooded areas. This “living laboratory” space allows for weather observations, year-round study of the lake, rock/mineral collection, topography, botany, and more. Also on campus are a regulation-sized soccer and baseball fields, and a cross country course.

There are several opportunities for students to participate in non-academic activities and events. All of the Lower School students spend one period a day in library, computer instruction, physical education, art, or music. In addition, they have the opportunity to participate in student council and various community-building events and activities, such as collecting donations for the local Hunger Center or planting trees on Arbor Day. In the Upper School, there is a wide range of extracurricular and athletic opportunities. Co-curricular options include drama club, advanced art, musical theater, soccer, cross country, basketball, baseball, video game club, yearbook, environmental club, student council, Spanish club, robotics, chess, bowling, and more.

Lawrence School has rolling admissions; they will accept a qualified student at any point in the school year. Tuition is prorated to the time of enrollment.
