Report from Council President Pro Tem Denny Linville

Based on today's world economy and the competition between cities and states in wooing businesses to relocate within their boundaries, elected officials are struggling to retain their current roster of businesses. Ben Venue's recent announcement that it will be closing its Bedford operations eerily reminds us of Ford's announcement two years ago that they will be closing their Walton Hills Stamping Plant. Both companies were the principal employers in each of their respective communities.

It is likely that Ben Venue will be out by January. The closing does affect Walton Hills because they have warehousing in the Village employing approximately 38 employees. The Village can weather the shutdown but for Bedford it will be much harder. Bedford's income tax rate is 2.25% and property tax rate is at a very high 21.7 mills compared to Walton Hills' income tax rate of 2.50% and a very low 0.30 mill property tax rate. The recent Walton Hills

income tax increase was incorporated mainly due to the significant drop in Ford's payroll tax revenue, which at one point exceeded \$1.6 million annually.

The Village has been pleasantly surprised with Ford's prolonged delay of the full shutdown. Nevertheless, Ford will eventually move out and the administration is very proactive in assuring that the Ford property will not be vacant too long after they finally cease production in Walton Hills. The same holds true for Bedford with the exception that Bedford officials already know when the vacancy will begin.

The table below details Ford's contribution in relation to real property taxes and payroll taxes submitted to the various governmental entities.

Dear Representative Anielski:

I write this letter with strong concerns for the Village of Walton Hills. As the mayor of this fine community for approximately 33 months, I have watched an ongoing pattern of no cooperation, communication and not once have you reached out to the Village of Walton Hills, which is one of the 17 communities you represent.

The Walton Hills Ford Stamping Plant announced in September of 2011 that they were closing. That projected date is now the end of 2014. You have not contacted my office one single time about this issue. You have not attended any of our Council or Committee of the Whole meetings or the Auto Community Revitalization Roundtable we hosted last year. The real concerns are as follows: Are you going to help us when we start to redevelop this property? Are you going to help us seek funding? Are you going to help us in any possible way?

Another strong concern I have is the budget that was passed at the end of June. There was a last minute amendment made by a senator that took away any possibility that Walton Hills would share in the hosting revenue from the Northfield Park Racino. The reason I bring this up is that our community was projected to receive approximately \$700,000 because 35% of Northfield Park is in Walton Hills. The statute clearly states you cannot have gambling or slot machines without a *racetrack*. It does not say a parking lot, it does not say a building - it says a *racetrack*. Northfield Park is the only *racetrack* in Ohio that is located in two counties.

These are two big concerns that continue to grow. I am sending you this letter wanting to know what you, as our State Representative, will be willing to do to help the Village of Walton Hills. We have heard rumors from Northfield Village that you have attended their Council meetings. I have personally seen you at the Rocksino's topping off party in August. Never once did you attempt to talk to me. Never once did you come forward and try to explain why we are not receiving any of the hosting money. We contacted the Ohio Municipal League to find out exactly what happened. I was told that there could be an amendment made to correct this injustice. Our State Representative should be pursuing this on behalf of our community; you are paid to represent the Village of Walton Hills. In addition, our State Senator, Tom Patton, should be pursuing this as well.

I am hoping that you will take your responsibilities more professional and could find a way to attend one of our Council or Committee of the Whole meetings to bring your constituents up to date on how you are working to help our Village. Please provide our Village with your schedule so we can pinpoint which meetings you could attend or even plan a special meeting that will accommodate your schedule.

The Village of Walton Hills has another important issue coming up and that is the federally mandated Health Insurance (Obama Care). We are having a town hall meeting on October 9th at the Gospel House Church to address federally mandated health care reform. Will you be available to attend and show your concern for Walton Hills?

Many of our residents were in Oakwood last year when you provided that community with pastries for one of their concerts. Never once have you provided anything to our Village. Never once have you communicated with the residents of Walton Hills through any means.

These are very strong concerns that I share with Council and many of our residents. Please respond as soon as possible. Give me some proof that we actually have some kind of representation from our State Representative.

Honor Flights to Honor Veterans

Joe Benedict is proud to have served his country in the Vietnam War. He was an Aviation Electrician in the U.S. Navy, assigned to the Phantom F-4 aboard the Franklin Roosevelt aircraft carrier. He also appreciates all of the sacrifices made by his fellow American veterans. That is why he got involved with Honor Flight Cleveland. It is their mission to pay tribute to U.S. veterans who served our country by providing them a safe and memorable all-expense paid trip to Washington D.C. to visit the memorials honoring their service.

Joe was invited by a friend of his who also served in the Vietnam War to become a guardian and accompany a veteran on an Honor Flight Cleveland trip as an escort. He went on a couple of flights, got more involved, and now serves as Honor Flight Cleveland's Board President and Director of Flight Operations. He has been on over 50 flights.

In May 2007, the inaugural flight of Honor Flight Cleveland flew from Cleveland Hopkins International Airport to Baltimore-Washington International Airport. From 2007 to 2012, more than 2,700 U.S. veterans have benefited from an Honor Flight Cleveland adventure. Nine flights are scheduled annually on the third Wednesday from May through November. If there are five Wednesdays in a month, there will be two flights scheduled that month. Veterans are flown on a first-come, first served basis. Within the applicants, top priority is given to World War II veterans. In addition, terminally ill U.S. veterans who served at any time are also given preferential treatment and assigned to a flight as soon as a seat becomes available. This special category of veterans is part of the TLC Program, meaning "Their Last Chance." Their next priority is given to Korean War veterans and then Vietnam War veterans.



For the first three years of Honor Flight Cleveland, an average of 70 veterans would be on each flight with only half of them needing a guardian escort. In the last few years, the average number of veterans on a flight has been 25. Since these veterans average 91 years of age and are often in wheelchairs, 25 guardians are usually on each flight. A nurse is also on all of the flights.

Some of the highlights of the Honor Flight experience include the following: the World War II Memorial, the Korean War Memorial, the Vietnam Memorial, the Lincoln Memorial, the Reflecting Pool, the Air Force Memorial, the Marine Memorial-Iwo Jima, and Arlington National Cemetery, including witnessing the Changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknowns and the honor of laying a wreath at the Tomb.

The Honor Flight Network has approximately 140 hubs across the country. They are largely funded by private donations from patriotic individuals that recognize our veterans' great accomplishments. This is the first year they have brought on board a corporate sponsor, the Ford Motor Company Fund.

What are the benefits of being involved with Honor Flight Cleveland? For Joe, it is the stories he hears from the men and women on the flights, the things you will never read in a book or see in a movie – truthful stories by people with real experiences. When the flight lands in Baltimore, Joe is awed by the members of the military who line up and the dozens of people who waive flags. He has seen 8th graders on hand to greet the veterans, thanking them for their service with a sincere hug. He loves to see the emotion in the veterans' faces, and he knows that being a part of Honor Flight Cleveland is something very special.

Economic Development Update

During our recent Committee of the Whole meeting of October 1, 2013, I reported that Walton Hills would be participating in a very important program for homeowners. Walton Hills is now a member of the Cleveland Restoration Society Heritage Home Program.

The Cleveland Restoration Program was originally set up for a few areas in the City of Cleveland to answer to the decline in house values. It has since expanded throughout Cuyahoga County. Its core benefit is dedicated to the maintenance and improvement of the housing stock and is supported by many Cuyahoga County foundations for the preservation of homes. This program is aimed at the repair, maintenance and improvement of houses over 50 years old and involves free technical advice to homeowners regarding repairs, materials and contractors. The Program also includes a low interest loan program administered by KeyBank and First Federal of Lakewood.

Here is a summary of what we can expect from this very important Program:

- There are 481 houses in Walton Hills that are more than 50 years old
- Free technical assistance with any maintenance, repair or rehab questions
- The home must either maintain or improve the property consistent with its design
- The homeowner need not reside in the home
- The homeowner must meet credit requirements and have equity in the home to cover the loan

- Key Bank and FFL will lend up to 90% of the after-rehab appraisal value of the property
- Fixed interest rates as low as 1.85% per year for 10 years
- There is no fee involved for loans under \$10,000
- The Program cannot fund luxury items such as hot tubs or swimming pools
- A direct mailing to every homeowner which falls in the 50 year and up category will occur in November notifying them of the details of this program

Finally, if you wish to participate in this Program, there will be a supply of literature at the Village Hill for you to pick up. Sagamore Road Rehabilitation and Water Main Project for 2014 – 2015

We are moving along with a proposal to rehabilitate Sagamore Road. This project runs the length of the road beginning at the western end in Valley View and ends at Northfield Road. It includes resurfacing, replacement of the water main, and installing new culverts where needed. This is an ongoing effort to renovate this area as some work, such as the bridge on Sonny Drive and some culverts, has already been completed. Work is slated to begin next July and be completed in March of 2015.

Each of the four communities that Sagamore Road runs through (Walton Hills, Northfield Village, Sagamore Hills Township, and Valley View) are participating in the rehabilitation. The total proposed cost of the project is \$4,052,678.00. Of this cost, the Cleveland Water District (CWD) will contribute \$2,365,157.44, and a 20% grant from the Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC) will provide \$810,535.60. This grant is awarded on a point system and we will get final notice of acceptance in either December or January. We are being advised that we have an excellent chance of approval, partly because the project involves multiple communities working in a concerted effort.

Local contributions will be based on the amount of roadway within the respective community.
The breakdown of the proposed funding is as follows:

Walton Hills has the largest portion of Sagamore Road within its boundaries. The administration and council will be reviewing payment options for our contribution in the near future. A couple of options that we have available to us are zero percent or low interest loans and bonding either as a stand-alone project or included with other projects and capital expenditures for needed equipment. We will keep you informed of future issues as this project moves forward.

Good Budgetary News!

The Egbert Road asphalt resurfacing project originally estimated at \$1,211,225 was amended to a final price of \$1,098,472, a saving of \$112,753. A full detailed report on the project will appear in next month's "Journal."



Spotlight on Education

I am on the Steering Committee for the Manufacturing Alliance of Communities. This organization is concerned with the revitalization of manufacturing in America and keeping in the forefront what manufacturing does for individual communities and all of the things that are positively impacted. The reason I want to broadcast this is that I have recently been working with the mayors of Oakwood, Glenwillow and Bedford Heights along with the Bedford School superintendent and a few of the school board members on how we need to get back to focusing on trade schools and get back to educating our children about the important role that manufacturing plays in America. We need to offer our youth the ability to pick up a trade that will make them a productive part of the blue collar work force and will sustain them and provide them with a good, comfortable living. This valuable education would make a difference in our neighborhoods and the nation as a whole.

In America, according to the latest Census Bureau statistics, we have approximately 600,000 manufacturing jobs that go unfulfilled because of a lack of training and skills in the American workforce. Our

younger generation and the unemployed are not seeking the trades as they did in the past. Our schools, along with our government, have lost site of the projection of our country's future. I want to challenge anyone to find a building inspector today that knows all of the trades – welding, plumbing, and electrical to name a few – and find me one that is under 30 years of age. They do not exist as they did in the past. America needs skilled trades' men and women.

We are working with administrators from Cuyahoga Community College's main campus in downtown Cleveland along with the mayors in the Bedford School system to develop an alternative trade program to offer to our young residents and it looks like we may get something together by January of 2014. This program would enable students to learn an important trade and pick up credit hours that they can use toward graduation. In preparation for this, we need to update our Village database and obtain an accurate number of how many high school seniors, juniors, sophomores and freshmen we have in our Village. We encourage our young residents or their parents to call

us at 440.232.7800 to let us know what grade they are in and what school (public or private) they attend. You can also drop off a note in our white mailbox at the Village Hall with this information.

The quality of education that can be obtained from a two or four year college is invaluable. However, it is often the case that many people who graduate from college have a hard time finding employment. Please keep in mind that acquiring any one of a number of trade skills is just as, if not more, valuable than a college education because these skill sets are in demand right now. It makes a great deal of sense to learn a skill that you know will have a position waiting for you when you are ready to enter the workforce!

Once again, please contact the Walton Hills Village Hall to help us update our database of school age children in our community. This will help us to prepare for many different programs such as the one that we are trying to put into action regarding an alternative trade program to benefit our children's futures.

Ordinance No. 2013-12, adopts Chapter 1452 of the Codified Ordinances with respect to certificates of inspection and rental licenses for residential rental units in the Village.

Resolution No. 2013-31, authorizes an agreement with R & R Landscaping & Snow Plowing for snow plowing services for senior and handicapped residents.

Resolution No. 2013-32, authorizes the donation of \$2,000 to the Honor Flight Cleveland Program from funds collected from the Village recycling program in the 4902 Veterans' Memorial Fund.
